Mission Partners Respond to Earthquake in Syria and Turkey

“Though the mountains be shaken, and the hills be removed, yet my unfailing love for you will not be shaken nor my covenant of peace be removed,” says the Lord, who has compassion on you.” –Isaiah 54:10

In the early morning hours of Monday, February 6, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck southern Turkey resulting in destruction there as well as northern Syria. That was followed by almost equally strong aftershocks throughout southern Turkey and northern Syria. Its impact was also felt in parts of Iraq, throughout Lebanon, and in parts of Jordan, Israel/Palestine and Cyprus.

Our Mission Co-Workers, Elmarie & Scott Parker jumped into action. Elmarie reports in her PC(USA) Mission update that *“My phone began filling with WhatsApp messages from local partners, neighbors, and friends almost immediately. All of us were checking in on each other. My building suffered no damage. I am safe.*

I spent the rest of the day messaging with all the National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon (NESSL) pastors in Syria and northern Lebanon, along with other partners and friends in Syria and Lebanon. Thanks be to God, none of our dear partners and friends lost their lives in this

quake. All of them began to immediately spring into action to offer shelter, blankets, food, water, medical assistance and hygiene packs to the many around them who were forced into the freezing cold rain and snow of the early morning hours as their homes collapsed around them.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance was in immediate contact with our partners as well. Already four emergency grants of \$10,000 each are being sent to four of our partners who are on the ground in Syria and have an impressive track record through these many years of struggle for implementing effective relief work benefiting everyone in the community. These four partners are: National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon (NESSL), Middle East Council of Churches (MECC), Forum for Development, Culture, and Dialogue (FDCD), and Fellowship of Middle East Evangelical Churches (FMEED). Between each of their expansive networks, they will be reaching many people in need over the coming months. Their immediate focus is on basic support: getting blankets, food, water, medicines and hygiene supplies to the network of local churches, mosques and schools that are offering displaced families emergency shelter. PC(USA) will be working with these partners to assess and collaborate on mid- to long-term recovery and rebuilding needs."

The CPC Mission Interpretation Commission (MIC) donated \$2,000, and The Refugee Concerns Team donated \$1,000 to Syria Lebanon Partnership Network – Earthquake Relief. MIC would also like to thank our CPC congregation for your individual donations through the Presbyterian Church, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for Syria and Turkey.

Local Legends Concert Series Returns

Elizabeth Hangan, Marguerite Millard, and Ellen Harper are longtime musicians now performing together as the Citrus Sisters. They will be at Claremont Presbyterian Church on May 20 at 6:00 PM playing some of their own tunes as well as traditional folk songs, with an invitation to the audience to sing along.

Harper, Hangan, and Millard have had personal connections for decades. Harper's parents opened the Folk Music Center in Claremont in 1958. Millard learned to play guitar from Harper's mother. And Hangan's parents in San Bernardino and Harper's parents in Claremont were friends. The Citrus Sisters perform such tunes as Bob Dylan's "You Ain't Goin' Nowhere," the gospel sing-a-long "This Little Light of Mine," Holly Near's "Singing for Our Lives," the spiritual "Wade in the Water," the calypso classic "Day-O," Millard's composition "Noah" and Harper's own "City of Dreams." Besides performing as the Citrus Sisters each has her own projects. Millard has a band, Squeakin' Wheels. Harper's 2021 memoir, "Always a Song," received nation-wide attention, including a NPR interview by Terry Gross. She's in her store five days a week. Hangan performs with various combinations of musicians, from funk to world music around Southern California.

Sacred Gardening as Spiritual Practice - a 2 part series

As you wind your way out, choose memories that are blessings of joy. Offer prayers of gratitude and blessings to the Holy God, who has given us our life with these joys. Think of ways you can bring blessings and joy to some others in your life.

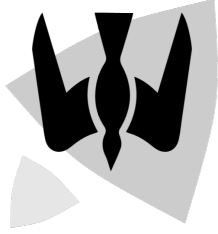
March Session Highlights
