Update from Haven New Worshiping Community

In June, the CPC Session voted to serve as anchor congregation for the Haven New Worshiping Community. Haven is part of the 1001 New Worshiping Communities initiative of the Presbyterian Church USA. Their current leader is Presbyterian Pastor Vikki Randalls. Pastor Vikki sent this update to keep us informed of their progress.

This has been an exciting season for Haven fellowship. In September we were approved for the seed grant which makes us an official part of PCUSA's 1001 worshiping communities. We've continued our pattern of meeting monthly for worship. We've added Jess Garcia as worship leader—Jess is part of the Q Worship Collective, helping us lean into our vision of being a queer-led church. With the funds from the seed grant we intend to hire an intern to help with our APU outreach as well as form a youth group (we have a couple of high schoolers already worshipping with us). So, while we are still in our infancy of formation, there is a real sense of moving forward.

Haven continues to be blessed and encouraged by the support we have received from Claremont Presbyterian Church, and the leadership of Pastor Karen and Pastor Brian. We are grateful for your words of affirmation!

Stewardship FAQs

Where do funds for CPC's operating expenses come from?

They come from US! Close to 85% of the income that funds our congregation's operating budget comes from pledges and other offerings. Without your generous pledges, we cannot sustain our ministries.

Why pledge? Can't I just give as I am able? On a personal level, making a pledge is important because it makes generosity a spiritual disci-

pline; a commitment that centers your life.

On a practical level, pledges enable our church leadership to plan. Pledges committed for the coming year form the basis for our annual operating budget. Pledges help our staff and lay leaders move ahead with confidence, knowing funds are committed to sustain their work.

How does our church manage its finances? The Session adopts an annual budget in January and presents it to the congregation. The Property and Finance Commission oversees the church's income and expenditures with the assistance of the church's Treasurer and our Administrative Assistant for Finance. Our financial records are reviewed annually by an independent auditing firm.

What about reserves and endowment funds? The generosity of our members and friends in previous years has given our church both reserves and endowment funds. These are primarily used to fund large capital expenses or major ministry initiatives that fall beyond the scope of our annual operating budget. They may be used to make up shortfalls in the budget with the approval of Session and, in certain cases, a congregational vote. Remembering the church in your estate planning is another way to support our ministries.

Updated Mask Guidelines

At its meeting on September 28, Session voted that starting November 1, masks will be strongly recommended, but not required, for indoor activities at CPC, including worship. We will continue to follow the guidance of the LA County Department of Public Health, which might include reinstating the mask requirement if LACDPH recommends doing so. If you have any questions about this change, please feel free to speak to one of our pastors or Session members.

Advent Season

The Advent season is fast approaching and we invite you and your family to join us at CPC as we prepare for the coming season as a community. We have many opportunities for you to participate. On Sunday, November 27, following the church service, we invite you to join us for our annual Advent workshop. Your family will enjoy crafts, treats and create an Advent wreath to take home. We will be rehearsing for the annual Christmas Pageant throughout November with a performance during the service on December 11. Join us for our annual Family Christmas Eve service to celebrate the birth of Christ with music and storytelling for the whole family. We look forward to worshipping with you this Advent season!
