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## From the Pastor

On the first Sunday of 2020, we gathered on the northeast corner of our campus to dedicate a Labyrinth. As I reflect, the labyrinth—and this labyrinth in particular, is an apt symbol for the work our congregation has done together over the last year.

First, the Labyrinth is an ancient form of prayer and meditation. During 2019, our congregation continued to emphasize creating new opportunities to encourage members and friends of the church to nurture their spiritual lives through engaging contemplative practices. Our Thursday Morning Meditation continued, we offered a monthly service of Prayer for Healing and Wholeness, we hosted a day-long retreat on The Enneagram as a tool for understanding ourselves in relation to the divine, and Advent included a weekly gathering for encountering the scripture texts of Advent through Mandala painting. And, of course, some of our members worked hard at designing and then overseeing the installation of our new labyrinth.

Second, the Labyrinth is not only a form of meditation, it is a form of **walking meditation. Saint Augustine is rumored to have once said, “It is solved by walking.” This means that we never figure out all the answers in advance.** The direction we need to move is revealed to us as we move forward. In 2019, CPC did a lot of stepping out in faith and watching the way open. We served Lemonade on the church patio on Wednesday afternoons and watched as the group of students and parents gathering grew from a dozen or so to over 50 each week. We asked if the parents of young adults would find a support group helpful, and walked our way into a gathering of 15 parents and a trained facilitator at our second meeting. We began folding paper doves for a simple Easter art installation and found that we had created a beautiful work that filled the whole sanctuary and stayed up until the beginning of Advent. We asked members of the church **and the wider community, “What’s keeping you up at night?” and found ourselves creating a summer sermon series called, “We Need to Talk,”** which offered insight from scripture on pressing issues and gathered a group on the patio each Sunday to talk about things that matter.

Finally, this Labyrinth is deliberately located at the border of our church property. We want people to find it. We want to invite encounters with **people we don’t know. We want people who are merely walking by, or** delivering their kids to school, or out for a morning run to become curious about the labyrinth and enter our space, our campus. This past year, we have worked hard to create ministries that face outward, that invite new people to engage with our congregation and its ministries. We want to tend

## Walking the Labyrinth

The labyrinth is a sacred place set aside for you to reflect, look within, pray, negotiate new behavior. The rhythm of walking, placing one foot in front of the other, empties the mind, relaxes the body and refreshes the spirit. Follow the pace your body wants to go.

The labyrinth can be walked in four stages. As you encounter other people walking the same path, simply allow them to pass. You walk the labyrinth with your body and rest your mind.

Remember: Before walking the labyrinth. Take time in gratitude—**be thankful for your life. Bless the people in your life. If there’s a specific event or situation troubling you, bring it to mind and form a healing question if possible.**

Release: Walking into the labyrinth. This is the time to quiet the mind, let go of the mind chatter and release your troubles. Open your heart to feel whatever it might feel. Become aware of your breathing. Take slow breaths. Relax and move at your own pace.

Receive: Standing or sitting in the center. This is a place of reflection. Pause and stay as long as you like. Open yourself to God. Listen to that small inner voice. In the safety of the labyrinth have a heart-to-heart talk with yourself.

Return: Walking out of the labyrinth. When you are ready, begin walking out the same path you followed in. Walking out, integration of your experience happens. Experience the sense of well-being, healing, excitement, calm or peace.

Each labyrinth experience is different. You may feel nothing or have a powerful reaction. Whatever, listen to your heart and take all the time you need. 

## Moment For Mission

The Mission Interpretation Commission (MIC) strives to support the congregation in our goal of being a Matthew 25 church. Matthew 25: 35 – 36 says “ For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.” One of the ministries MIC supports is Inland Valley Hope Partners (IVHP) because it is committed to the service of feeding the hungry and sheltering the homeless in the Inland Valley. For 2019 the MIC sent \$400 a month to Inland Valley Hope Partners (IVHP). At the end of 2019 MIC sent an additional \$1,000 to IVHP. MIC would like to share with the CPC congregation the ministries of the IVHP that were supported, in part, from these MIC funds:

In 2019 IVHP:

- Assisted more than 70,000 individuals across their spectrum of services
- Housed 41 homeless families (including 21 children and 20 adults) in the Our House Temporary Housing Program. Providing 3,292 bed nights.
- Moved 22 families from homelessness to safe and stable housing through the Rapid Re-Housing Program
- Supported 45 families with one time rental assistance
- Fed 42,987 children, women and men with emergency, staple foods. That was estimated by IVHP to be enough for 644,805 meals distributed by IVHP Food Security Program.
- Harvested 8,000 lbs of fresh fruits and vegetables from the **Hope Partners Garden at Amy’s Farm to feed clients in the IVHP Housing and Food Security Programs.**
- Extended the food budgets of 7,800 low-income families to include more fresh produce through the Market Match **program offered at our Pomona Valley Certified Farmers’ Market.**
- Assisted more than 237 low-income school children with backpacks full of school supplies.
- **Facilitated the “adoption” of 135 families through the IVHP Adopt-A-Family Holiday Gift Program.**

Thank you to the CPC congregation for your offerings that were used by the Mission Interpretation Commission to support the ministries of IVHP by feeding the hungry and sheltering the homeless in the Inland Valley.
